Understanding your Statement of Results

Cambridge English: Advanced, commonly known as Certificate of Advanced English (CAE)

Your Statement of Results for Cambridge English: Advanced gives you three pieces of information:

1. Your grade: This is the most important piece of information. If you pass the exam, you will get a certificate with your grade on it.

Or you could have one of these on your statement of results:

X - you were absent from part of the exam

Z - you were absent from the whole of the exam

Pending - your result is not ready yet

Withheld - you need to contact your centre

2. Your score: This is your score for the whole exam. You can see whether your score is near the top of the grade, in the middle or near the bottom.

Your score is shown as a number between 0 and 100 which is converted from the total number of marks available in the exam. It is converted so that the score you need for each grade is the same every time the exam is taken. This is called a *standardised score*. Your score will not be shown on your certificate.

3. Your candidate profile: This shows you how you performed on each of the papers in the exam. For each paper it shows how you performed compared to the standard of all the other candidates taking that paper at the same time. If you did not get the grade you wanted, it will help you to decide which skills you need to improve.

NB: the bands on the *Candidate Profile* do not correspond to grades.

Your Certificate

Certificates are awarded to candidates receiving grades A, B or C.

Candidates achieving Grades B and C at *Cambridge English: Advanced* will receive certificates at Level C1.

Exceptional candidates sometimes display ability beyond the C1 level. To recognise this, candidates achieving Grade A will receive a *Cambridge English: Advanced* certificate, which indicates that their performance is at C2 Level.

On the back of your certificate you will find additional information about the exam you have taken and Can Do statements for Council of Europe Levels C1 and C2.

There are no pass or fail levels in the individual papers. Your marks for each paper are added together to calculate your grade for the whole examination.

The Certificate in Advanced English (CAE) is a general proficiency examination at Council of Europe Level C1 in the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR). It is at Level 2 in the UK National Qualifications Framework (NQF).

Interpretation of overall grades
Grade C covers the range of ability from a borderline pass to good achievement at the level. Grade B indicates the range of good achievement up to Grade A, which demonstrates an ability at Council of Europe Level C2. Grade D is a narrow fail.

The total number of marks available in the examination is 200. Marks out of 200 are converted to a standardised score out of 100.

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The Common European Framework of Reference

The Common European Framework of Reference for Languages: (CEFR) is a system for describing what learners can do in a foreign language at each of six levels, from A1 (the lowest) to C2 (the highest).

Cambridge English exams are developed in accordance with the principles and approach of the CEFR, which means that when employers, schools, universities and other institutions look at your certificate or statement of results, they can find out whether your English is at the appropriate level for them.
